Pastor's Page

November begins with All Saints Day. On this day we remember all the saints who have gone before us in the faith and we remember specifically those who have died since the previous All Saints Day. This year I find myself in deep mourning. On August 19th 2009 the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America died as a church. I am saddened by this death. The reason that the ELCA has died as a church is simple. On that day in August, the National Assembly voted to overturn the Word of God as clearly stated in scripture concerning the issue of homosexuality. I realize that we are all sinners and fall short of the glory of God, however, when we make decisions as a church we must put aside our desire to remain in sin, fulfilling our wants and desires. As a church or a gathering of believers we must always rely on what scripture tells us. I was not at the assembly but from what I have heard and read not one of our sixty-five bishops spoke to the assembly against this decision. I have heard rumors that at least ten of these bishops do not support the position. If this is true, then why the silence? One of the roles of a bishop is to uphold the scripture and defend the traditions of the church (unless the tradition is in conflict with the scripture, in which case the scripture must be upheld). Our bishops failed us when it came to upholding the scripture and our traditions. 676 people made this decision for us. 676 people are smarter than the Word of God. 676 people are more enlightened than the millions upon millions of Christians who have gone before us and upheld the scriptures concerning this matter. Apparently, they know better than the rest of us. Apparently when God forbade this in both the Old Testament and the New Testament, He was wrong. The decision was made by 676 people, whose arrogance will be legendary. They have eaten of the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil by the bushel and they think their authority is greater than God's. (The issues of same sex relationships, rostering of pastors in same sex relationships, and ministry policy changes were presented and voted on as three separate issues. See the excerpt from Bishop Riley's **REFLECTIONS ON THE EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH IN AMERICA and the 2009 CHURCHWIDE ASSEMBLY DECISIONS** included in this edition of the Newsletter. Ask me if you would like a complete copy covering all the actions and resolutions of the ELCA Assembly)

Some congregations have already left the ELCA including the Community Church of Joy in Arizona, which was the tenth largest congregation in the ELCA. Some congregations are in great turmoil and divided over how to respond to the issue. Some are cutting back or redirecting benevolence dollars away from the ELCA.

Some of you have questioned why I have not reacted to the decision. I have not reacted because I prefer to act instead. Reacting is often a 'knee-jerk' response guided by fear and anger. Acting is powered by patience, reflection and thought. I would rather my response be a well thought out and appropriate action than a childish display of anger and fear.

Recently I attended a meeting among pastors and lay people in which we discussed the actions of the assembly and how best to respond to the circumstance in which we now find ourselves. At this meeting we were informed of the response of **Lutheran CORE (COalition for REnewal;** for more information see the article about **Lutheran CORE** in this edition of the Newsletter). Since the Assembly, **Lutheran CORE** has received an impressive amount of interest from pastors, congregations and lay people. At its September meeting, **Lutheran CORE** formed a task group that will be exploring ways that pastors and congregations can respond to the actions taken by the Assembly. The task force will spend a year discussing and researching various options including the long-term effects of each option as well as any legal issues involved. **Lutheran CORE** believes that we should treat this as we would a major death in our family where rule number one is not to make any major decisions for a year. I am in agreement with this because of the reasons I have stated previously in this article. The ELCA thinks it has broken down a barrier by these actions. Unfortunately they have only moved the barrier, and those who uphold the authority of scripture and the Word of God are now on the other side. This situation will be addressed further in my annual report and at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation on November 8th.

About Lutheran CORE Coalition for Reform

Lutheran CORE is a coalition of pastors, lay people, congregations and reforming groups. We seek to preserve within the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America the authority of the Word of God according to the Lutheran confessions. Our intention is to remain within our church and to work with congregations, individuals, and other reform-minded groups for the reform of our own church, by:

- 1) Encouraging individual reform-minded congregations, laypersons, and pastors.
- 2) Supporting and offering coordination for the various renewal groups within the ELCA.
- 3) Addressing significant synodical and churchwide issues.

Among a host of issues within the ELCA today, there are three that trouble us most deeply. These are:

- the need to affirm the authority of the Word of God within and throughout our church;
- our concern to elect leaders (both synodical and churchwide) who will guide us in faithful witness and mission;
- and our profound concern over changes in doctrine and practice regarding marriage and sexuality.

As a Lutheran “Coalition for Reform” we are committed to raising up leaders at all levels of our church who share our convictions regarding Biblical authority and confessional loyalty. We are committed to working for a consistent implementation of Vision and Expectations throughout the ELCA, one that will provide a ministry of oversight and discipline for all rostered leaders within our church.

Lutheran CORE is closely allied with the [WordAlone Network](#) for mutual support. However, Lutheran CORE is a broad based coalition and is open to those individuals and congregations who do not choose to affiliate with the WordAlone Network. Lutheran CORE also supports the Lutheran Churches of the Common Confession (LC3), whose aim is the renewal of congregational ministry and mission. Our goal as Lutheran CORE is to work for the reform of the ELCA, and to serve as a channel of cooperation among the various reform-minded groups and with reform-minded congregations and individual pastors and lay people.

Excerpts from...REFLECTIONS ON THE EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH IN AMERICA and the 2009 CHURCHWIDE ASSEMBLY DECISIONS

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Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust (Adopted 676-338)

After many years of very intentional study and deep deliberation, this church adopted a social statement on human sexuality. The statement is framed by the two great commandments: *You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. You shall love your neighbor as yourself.* Within that framework the statement points to trust as being integral to all relationships and develops its teaching around that pivotal point.

*Human beings learn about trust from God. When the Lutheran Confessions discuss faith in God, they understand it fundamentally as trust or absolute confidence in God. In faith nurtured by the Holy Spirit through Word and sacrament, we entrust our whole lives to God. We experience God's unfailing trustworthiness in God's relationship with us through the Gospel and through God's deep mercy and compassion in response to our human frailty. In response, as forgiven and justified people, we seek to respond to God's love for us through care for the neighbor, fostering trust in order that individuals and society might flourish. (**Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust**).*

From there this social statement launches an exploration of the gift of human sexuality across a range of aspects and situations asking, as Tina Turner might inquire, "What's *trust and love for the neighbor* got to do with it?" Areas of examination include marriage, same-gender relationships, loving families, protecting children and youth, sexual identity, gender and friendships, commitment, adult cohabitation, sexual exploitation and commodification, sexuality in the workplace, and moral discernment. Study and moral deliberation around this statement will be no small task, but, I believe, very much worth the effort. I commend it to you.

Recommendations on Ministry Policies

The 2007 ELCA Churchwide Assembly specifically asked the Task Force for ELCA Studies on Sexuality "to address and make recommendations on changes to any policies that preclude practicing homosexual persons from the rosters of this church." The Church Council received the recommendations, transmitting them to the Churchwide Assembly as four separate resolutions.

+ *RESOLVED, that in the implementation of any resolutions on ministry policies, the ELCA commit itself to bear one another's burdens, love the neighbor, and respect the bound consciences of all..* (Adopted, 771-230). This was actually the third resolution presented by the task force. The Assembly chose to address it first. The emphasis is not on *my* bound conscience, *my* particular perspective or opinion, but rather the conscience-bound belief of the other, *my* neighbor.

+ *RESOLVED, that the ELCA commit itself to finding ways to allow congregations that choose to do so to recognize, support and hold publicly accountable life-long, monogamous, same-gender relationships.* (Adopted 619-402). This, it seems to me, pushes us toward more discernment and definition. I believe that this action moves the decision *to recognize, support and hold publicly accountable* beyond a pastor's discretion to at least the purview of the Congregation Council. We are creating space for those congregations who believe that for the sake of the neighbor and for a stronger mission engagement in their context, their welcome of and ministry with and to gay and lesbian persons should be more intentional and affirming.

+ *RESOLVED, that the ELCA commit itself to finding a way for people in such publicly accountable, lifelong, monogamous, same-gender relationships to serve as rostered leaders of this church.* (Adopted 559-451) This resolution was followed by a more detailed description of how this church would begin to move in this direction, summarized as follows:

+ *This resolution called upon members to respect the bound consciences of those with whom they disagree; declared intent to allow structured flexibility in decision-making about candidacy and the call process; eliminated the prohibition of rostered service by members in publicly accountable, lifelong, monogamous same-gender relationships; recognized and committed to respect the conviction of members who believe that the ELCA should not call or roster people in committed same-gender relationships; called for development of accountability guidelines; directed that amendments to ministry policy documents be drafted and approved; and stated that this church continue to trust congregations, bishops, synods and others responsible for determining who should be called into public ministry. (Adopted 667-307).*

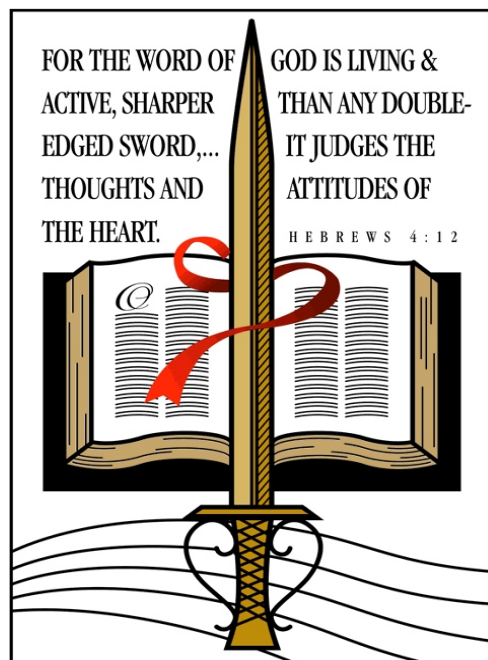
These last two resolutions can best and most simply be described as removing a barrier that has heretofore precluded gay and lesbians persons in committed relationships from being considered for rostered ministry in this church. Existing processes within this church have not changed, nor will they. Congregations still make the final decision about who will or will not be called as their pastor. Synod Candidacy Committees will continue to do their work of discernment as they always have, except for the fact that some persons previously automatically excluded from consideration may now be engaged in the process. Bishops continue to have the same role with accountability guidelines and amendments to ministry policy documents will take some time. This will be done deliberately and with care.

CONTINUING ISSUES AND QUESTIONS...

The seventeen years of discussion in this church related to human sexuality have clearly revealed a serious and ongoing debate for Lutherans on the authority of scripture. The Book of Faith Initiative is right on cue. Authority and interpretation of scripture are different questions. We should continue our work on both. We also should work on the difference between ecclesiology and polity, and what is at the essence of this faith and what is not. And, we continue to wrestle with what it means to be a public church engaged with and in the world.

With all of this, the ELCA continues to make an enormous difference for good in the world every day. We are a bridge church to so many ecumenical and inter-faith partners. But perhaps most importantly today, we are a church that knows its unity to be in Christ our Savior, a unity beyond our disagreements. We are called to journey together faithfully for the sake of the Gospel. I am glad to be with you in this church on that journey.

Thank you to all who donated. For our Clothing Closet we need clean, gently used clothes for men, women, children, and infants. All donations can be left in the container on the porch at 17 Knight.

We also enjoyed our fall breakfast where the "pumpkin pancakes" were again a big hit. Many people enjoyed the food and fellowship and the balance of the free will offering will be set aside for our outreach programs. Thank you to all the helpers who pitched in when some of our regular members were not able to help.

A BIG THANK YOU to all who made donations to our food pantry for the month of October. The matching funds from Thrivent are very much needed as our pantry members continue to increase. We helped 73 families in October and 7 of those were new. The monies collected will certainly help us make ends meet as our monthly shopping bill can reach as much as \$1000.

November is Fall Harvest time. We will again be providing our families with a Thanksgiving basket filled with a turkey and all the traditional Thanksgiving foods. Our turkey arrives November 1st. If you would like to provide a frozen turkey, please sign your name and phone number on the back of a feather and help us "dress" our bird. 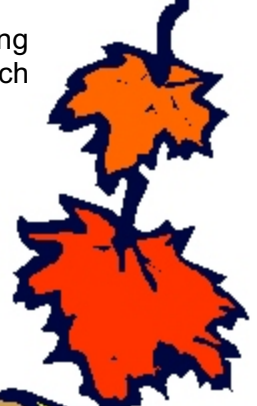

Prayer Shawl Ministry

We were please and blessed to have 7 women in attendance at this meeting of our Prayer Shawl Family: Elaine Alspach, Barbara Anconetani, Val Colasuonno, Helen Elliott, Dolores Keller, Sally Miller, and me. Others who will be joining us are: Beverly Bethany, Mary Farrell, and Ellie Nolan. Ileana Quinn, Susan Belzer and Jane Tedesco have offered to make shawls for us. This is an exciting time. Our group was born of our love of the Lord and our desire to give comfort and solace is our motivation. Prayers and blessings go into each shawl for the recipients.

We decided to meet once a month on the 1st Friday of the month. The next meeting will be Friday, November 6, 2009. We decided we will work on our shawls at home. We discussed criteria for presenting finished shawls to needy recipients. Pastor Andy will be making suggestions as time goes by. Along with the shawl, a letter from our group will be sent with every shawl we give detailing our Ministry work.

Basic patterns were distributed for knitting and crocheting. (The prayer shawl is based on patterns of 3. The number three symbolizes the Trinity (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. It is said that the number 3 is used 523 times in scripture. Is that right, Pastor Andy?) Two Prayer Shawl Books have been purchased which will assist us in our endeavors. They contain blessings, prayers, and give us more patterns to choose from. A log will be kept detailing what we accomplish, who contributes the prayer shawls, and our recipients. It will take us a while to get established as the work of the prayer shawls takes time.

The shawls will not receive criticism or be critiqued. So, if you are thinking of brushing up on your old skills, we are the group for you. A bit casual but all are willing. We bet you would enjoy giving comfort and care from your own handwork. Just show up at our next meeting. We would love to have you with us.
